# **Follow Christ**

Romans 15:1-13 April 21, 2016

## :1-2 **I. We must bear with one another.**

<sup>1</sup>We who are strong have an obligation to bear with the failings of the weak, and not to please ourselves. <sup>2</sup> Let each of us please his neighbor for his good, to build him up.

- Not at the expense of the Gospel. cf. Galatians 6-19; 5:11
- ♦ Not for ourselves. cf. Ephesians 6:5-6; I Thessalonians 1:24; I Corinthians 9:19-23; 10:33
- Not just to endure or to tolerate, but to bear each other's burdens. cf. Matthew 8:17; Galatians 6:2
- Not just negatively, but positively for his good, to build him up.

### :3-13 **II.** We must bear with one another because of Christ.

:3-4	A. Christ came to suffer for us. <sup>3</sup> For Christ did not please himself, but as it is written, "The reproaches of those who reproached you fell on me." <sup>4</sup> For whatever was written in former days was written for our instruction, that through endurance and through the encouragement of the Scriptures we might have hope.

	Scriptural encouragement + endurance $\rightarrow$ hope cf. II Timothy 3:16; Romans 1:2; 3:21, 31; 5:3-5; 15:12-13; 16:26
:5-12	B. Christ came to unite us in glorifying God. <sup>5</sup> May the God of endurance and encouragement grant you to live in such harmony with one another, in accord with Christ Jesus, <sup>6</sup> that together you may with one voice glorify the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ. <sup>7</sup> Therefore welcome one another as Christ has welcomed you, for the glory of God.

#### 2. He came for the Gentiles.

<sup>9</sup> and in order that the Gentiles might glorify God for his mercy. As it is written, "Therefore I will praise you among the Gentiles, and sing to your name." <sup>10</sup> And again it is said, "Rejoice, O Gentiles, with his people." <sup>11</sup> And again, "Praise the Lord, all you Gentiles, and let all the peoples extol him." <sup>12</sup> And again Isaiah says, "The root of Jesse will come, even he who arises to rule the Gentiles; in him will the Gentiles hope."
