One of the benefits of working in a capital city like Addis Ababa is encountering people from all over Africa and our surrounding region. Among the countless Ethiopians (many from the countryside) are families from South Sudan, Djibouti, Yemen and various countries in North Africa. Just last week, a tall gentleman from Eritrea walked slowly into my exam room with the assistance of a walking stick, accompanied by his younger family members. I could see that he was nursing an old injury to his left leg. "He was a soldier," a young woman explained through a translator. I was not surprised about his profession given his serious demeanor and *very* firm handshake.

With the recent peace agreement between Ethiopia and Eritrea, this family had wasted no time crossing the border to seek medical care for their father's failing vision. He could barely detect light through his right eye due to a dense cataract that looked more like a fried egg than a lens one could see through.

After a carefully planned surgery, my patient returned the next morning for his check up. As soon as we removed the patch, a big grin broke out on his face - the first and only time I saw him smile. This proud man stood up without assistance and raised his arms to pronounce a blessing on me and my staff. We celebrated together his new-found sight and wished blessings upon his family as they prepared to journey back home. I look forward to many such encounters. Perhaps next time I will be the one to cross the border.
