Spiritual Revival: Seek the Lord

In our text today, we see that, as a result of spiritual revival, God's people experience great joy. Let's look at our text:

2 Chronicles 15:1-19

The Spirit of God came upon Azariah the son of Oded, 2 and he went out to meet Asa and said to him, "Hear me, Asa, and all Judah and Benjamin: The Lord is with you while you are with him. If you seek him, he will be found by you, but if you forsake him, he will forsake you. 3 For a long time Israel was without the true God, and without a teaching priest and without law, 4 but when in their distress they turned to the Lord, the God of Israel, and sought him, he was found by them. 5 In those times there was no peace to him who went out or to him who came in, for great disturbances afflicted all the inhabitants of the lands. 6 They were broken in pieces. Nation was crushed by nation and city by city, for God troubled them with every sort of distress. 7 But you, take courage! Do not let your hands be weak, for your work shall be rewarded."

- 8 As soon as Asa heard these words, the prophecy of Azariah the son of Oded, he took courage and put away the detestable idols from all the land of Judah and Benjamin and from the cities that he had taken in the hill country of Ephraim, and he repaired the altar of the Lord that was in front of the vestibule of the house of the Lord. 9 And he gathered all Judah and Benjamin, and those from Ephraim, Manasseh, and Simeon who were residing with them, for great numbers had deserted to him from Israel when they saw that the Lord his God was with him. 10 They were gathered at Jerusalem in the third month of the fifteenth year of the reign of Asa. 11 They sacrificed to the Lord on that day from the spoil that they had brought 700 oxen and 7,000 sheep. 12 And they entered into a covenant to seek the Lord, the God of their fathers, with all their heart and with all their soul, 13 but that whoever would not seek the Lord, the God of Israel, should be put to death, whether young or old, man or woman. 14 They swore an oath to the Lord with a loud voice and with shouting and with trumpets and with horns. 15 And all Judah rejoiced over the oath, for they had sworn with all their heart and had sought him with their whole desire, and he was found by them, and the Lord gave them rest all around.
- 16 Even Maacah, his mother, King Asa removed from being queen mother because she had made a detestable image for Asherah. Asa cut down her image, crushed it, and burned it at the brook Kidron. 17 But the high places were not taken out of Israel. Nevertheless, the heart of Asa was wholly true all his days. 18 And he brought into the house of God the sacred gifts of his father and his own sacred gifts, silver, and gold, and vessels. 19 And there was no more war until the thirty-fifth year of the reign of Asa.

1. They had sworn to seek the Lord (v. 15a)

What does it mean to seek the Lord? From the surrounding context we see that it means first of all to obey the Lord (see 14:4). Jesus said that "if you love me, keep my commandments." It is still true that if we are seeking the Lord we will obey His commands. Secondly, to seek the Lord means to rely upon Him (see 14:11). When Asa was under duress and stress, he relied upon the Lord alone for victory over his enemies. So it is with us as well. Thirdly, to seek the Lord means to love Him with all our hearts (see 15:12). When we seek the Lord we pursue hard after Him. God said in Jeremiah 29:13 "you will seek me and find me when you seek me with all your heart." Seeking is the opposite of forsaking or abandoning the Lord (see 15:2).

We can see that in idolatry we also obey, trust, and love the idols of our lives. From the example of Asa we can clearly see that these idols must be smashed — even if it's the queen mother! Look at 15:16 and see that even one's mother must be confronted when it comes to idolatry.

II. God was found by them (v. 15b)

The Scriptures teach us that faith believes that God is and that He is a rewarder of those who seek Him. Jesus promised that if we seek we will find. The people of God under King Asa

found the Lord because the Lord allowed Himself to be found. The reason the Lord was found by His people is that He in fact seeks us. Jesus said He came to seek and to save that which was lost. The hymn writer puts it this way:

I sought the Lord, after afterward I knew He moved my heart to seek Him, seeking me. It was not I that found, O Savior true; No, I was found of Thee.

III. The Lord gave them rest all around (v.15c)

The result of finding the Lord is the exquisite experience of rest from the deity. What is this rest? First of all, and most commonly, it is security from all of our surrounding enemies. It is true today that when we trust the Lord and seek hard after Him, we experience the security of our own salvation, which brings us rest. Secondly, rest means to cease from our labors, just as God did after He created the heavens and the earth, and which we are to do one day out of seven. In fact, our whole salvation is dependent on our ceasing from our moral and spiritual labors and resting in His labor on our behalf. We know that there still remains a Sabbath rest for the people of God (see Hebrews 4), as when we arrive in the new heavens and the new earth, we shall completely rest from our labors. Thirdly, rest implies total satisfaction. We find our joy completely in the Lord, which overflows. This is why Jesus said to us, "Come to me, all who labor and are heavy laden, and I will give you rest" (Matthew 11:28).

All Judah rejoiced because they vowed to seek the Lord, they found the Lord, and the Lord gave them rest all around. Malcolm Muggeridge, in his senior years, put it this way: "The most important thing is seeking God; and having sought Him to find Him; and having found Him to love Him."
